## North Dakota Department of Environmental Quality Shares Update on EPA's Lead and Copper Rule Requirements

BISMARCK, N.D. – The North Dakota Department of Environmental Quality (NDDEQ) is updating residents on the state's efforts to comply with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) Lead and Copper Rule Revision, a federal effort to reduce lead exposure in drinking water. This rule prioritizes the identification and replacement of lead service lines to further safeguard public health.

EPA revisions to the Lead and Copper Rules under the Safe Drinking Water Act require public water systems (PWS) to submit an initial service line inventory by Oct. 16, 2024, and an updated baseline inventory by November 2027. The inventory must document the material type for both the public and private side of all service lines within the PWS and categorize them as lead, non-lead, galvanized requiring replacement, or unknown.

Public water systems must notify customers, annually, in writing, about the material type of their service line if it is anything other than non-lead. Service lines labeled as "unknown" must be verified through visual assessments or historical documentation. In many cases, customers will be asked to complete surveys or allow PWS personnel waterline access to verify the material type on-site. Identifying unknown service lines before November 2027 will help public water systems make necessary decisions and implement required changes efficiently.

To help the public better understand how the rule affects them, the NDDEQ recently hosted a public webinar titled "How Does the EPA's Lead and Copper Rule Affect Me?" The recorded webinar is available for viewing at <u>deq.nd.gov</u>. It provides an overview of the new rules, explains North Dakota's current compliance progress, and discusses consumer confidence reports and service line inventory procedures.
