

Minutes of the 83rd Annual Meeting of the North Dakota Water and Pollution Control Conference

The 83rd Annual Meeting of the North Dakota Water and Pollution Control Conference (NDWPCC) was held October 11, 12 and 13, 2011 at the Ramkota Hotel, Bismarck, North Dakota. The annual meeting/convention was held jointly with the North Dakota Chapter of the American Public Works Association (NDCAPWA), the North Dakota Water Environment Association (NDWEA), and the North Dakota Section of the American Water Works Association (NDAWWA).

The NDAWWA Education and Research Committee held a pre-conference meeting at 7:30 p.m. on Monday, October 10, 2011, in the Governor's Room of the Ramkota Hotel.

Board meetings were held Tuesday, October 11, 2011 by NDAWWA at 7:30 a.m. in the Governor's Room, NDCAPWA at 8:00 a.m. in the Seasons Café I, and NDWEA at 8:00 a.m. in the Seasons Café II. Additional NDAWWA committee meetings were held at 10:30 a.m. in the Governor's Room following the 9:30 a.m. joint board meeting. During the board meetings, the associations planned their business luncheons, heard committee reports, accepted volunteers for committees, and conducted other business, as needed. meetings were held Tuesday, October 11, (NDAWWA); Wednesday, October 12, (NDWEA); and Thursday, October 13, (NDCAPWA and NDWPCC).

North Dakota Department of Health (NDDH) operator certification exams were written Tuesday, October 11, 2011, from 7:30-11:30 a.m. in Room 2160, with 20 operators taking 25 exams. Registration opened at 8:00 a.m. on Tuesday, October 11, with Patty Carman and Darlene Germain welcoming all attendees. A total of 377 pre-registered, with final attendance reaching 371.

The joint board of directors of the NDWPCC, NDWEA, NDCAPWA, and NDAWWA met at 9:30 a.m. Tuesday,

October 11, in the Governor's Room with NDWPCC President Chuck Abel presiding. President Abel called the meeting to order at 9:37 a.m. The following board members and guests were in attendance: Chuck Abel, Lisa Ansley, Mike Brisben, David Bruschwein, Jim Chaffee, Qigang Chang, Dustin Dale, Eric Dodds, Bill Gefroh, Rick Gillund, Nancy Huether, Dan Jonasson, Wei Lin, Seth Lynne, Lance Meyer, Karla Olson, Tim Paustian, Meredith Quinn, Darin Schaeffer, Dean Sletten, Jacob Strombeck, Nancy Sullivan, Larry Thelen, Don Tucker, Eric Volk, Jess Wagner, Tanush Wadhawan, and Chad Zander.

President Abel entertained a motion to dispense with reading of the minutes from the May 17, 2011 joint board meeting at the Seven Seas Hotel in Mandan and approve the copy mailed to each board member or those published in the conference issue of the *Official Bulletin*. Rick Gillund so moved. Dan Jonasson seconded, and the motion carried.

Next, President Abel called for the financial report. Mike Brisben presented the January 1, 2011-September 30, 2011 NDWPCC treasurer's report, which showed a net income of \$31,061.93 and total assets of \$106,202.72. Dean Sletten moved to accept the treasurer's report as presented. Bill Gefroh seconded, and the motion carried.

Moving to old business, President Abel called for a report on the 2011 student/young professionals (YP) reception. Eric Dodds reported that 12 students from NDSU and several from UND would be in attendance. Mr. Dodds noted that the reception would be at Famous Dave's starting at 7:00 p.m. President Abel next called for a report on the AWWA YP poster competition. Meredith Quinn indicated that ten posters were entered, seven from NDSU and three from UND. Ms. Quinn noted that a panel of judges had been selected and the competition would be from 8:00 a.m.-11:00 a.m. Wednesday, October 12, in the registration area.

President Abel called for any other old business. Hearing none, President Abel called for volunteers for the NDWPCC officer nominating committee. Mr. Brisben noted that one incoming director and the associate director positions were needed. Lisa Ansley, Rick Gillund, and Dean Sletten volunteered. Next, President Abel asked for volunteers for the auditing committee. Bill Gefroh and Meredith Quinn agreed to serve on the committee. Mr. Brisben noted that the NDWPCC audit could be completed at the Ramkota Hotel during the conference or at the Environmental Training Center at a later date. Ms. Ansley recommended the audit be completed at the Environmental Training Center prior to the January 2012 joint board meeting in Mandan.

Continuing with new business, President Abel asked board members to consider nominations for life membership to be voted on at the Thursday NDWPCC business luncheon. Next, Mr. Brisben reviewed activities for the 83rd annual meeting, which included the golf tournament, the student/ YP reception, three concurrent sessions, tours, team trivia, breakfast poker, the awards banquet, and exhibitor program. Larry Thelen added the AWWA Water Taste Test Wednesday morning during the exhibitor program to the list of activities. Continuing with new business, President Abel called for topics and presenters for the spring operator training sessions and 2012 fall conference. Ms. Ansley and Eric Volk asked if dates for the January 2012 board meeting and spring training had been set. Mr. Brisben noted that a January date had not been set and that six operator training sessions would be held in March and April. Mr. Dodds offered WEF's training in a box as an option for wastewater topics during spring training.

President Abel called for any other new business. Hearing none, President Abel called for a motion to adjourn. Seth Lynne so moved. Dan Jonasson seconded, and the motion carried. The meeting adjourned at 9:59 a.m.

Water samples for the 20th annual water taste test, sponsored by NDAWWA, were accepted throughout the day Tuesday and on Wednesday morning.

The Tuesday luncheon and NDAWWA business meeting were held in the Courtyard with NDAWWA Chair Dean Sletten presiding. NDWPCC President Chuck Abel welcomed all attendees on behalf of the joint board of directors, and Bismarck Mayor John Warford welcomed all on behalf of the city. 

Minutes of the Board of Trustees Meeting North Dakota Section of AWWA

October 11, 2011

The fall meeting of the North Dakota Section of the American Water Works Association was held at the Ramkota Inn of Bismarck, N.D. on October 11, 2011. Present at the meeting were Chair Dean Sletten; AWWA Vice-President Jim Chaffee; Chair-elect Tim Paustian; Director Lisa Ansley; Trustees Dennis Larson, Jason Sorenson, Nancy Huether and Eric Volk; Secretary/ Treasurer David Bruschwein; Assistant Secretary Treasurers Larry Thelen, and Greg Wavra. Others attending the meeting were Nancy Sullivan, Brett Jochim, Tanush Wadhawan, Meredith Quinn and Dr. Wei Lin.

The meeting was called to order by Mr. Sletten at 7:40 a.m.

The Secretary's Report was presented by Mr. Bruschwein. Mr. Paustian moved to approve the minutes of the May 17, 2011 Board meeting. Mr. Volk seconded, and the motion passed.

Mr. Wavra presented the treasurer's report. As of October 6, 2011, the section had income of \$22,333.45 and expenses of \$20,861.21. The section has \$24,397.75 in the checking and money market accounts. The section also has \$83,215.78 in scholarship endowments and reserve account. Mr. Volk moved to accept the treasurer's report. Ms. Ansley seconded and the motion carried.

Committee Reports

Education and Research Committee

Ms. Quinn presented the Education Committee report. The first topic covered was the NDSU Student Chapter. The student chapter currently has 28 members and has received an additional seven applications. The UND Student Chapter has 6 new members and also will participate at WEFTEC. Prizes this year were certificates at the state science fair and water bottles at the regional competitions. Cash and certificates were given at the state competition in lieu of a plaque and cash. UND students and two Grand Forks operators helped judge.

The Surface Water Workshop will be held April 24-26, 2012 in Moorhead. A registration form will be in the next issue of the *Official Bulletin*.

There is only one operator certification award this year. This is significantly less than the average 5 to 10 that are normally presented.

There was discussion on the best way to get the word out on the Water Utility Management Institute Scholarship. It was informally decided that word of mouth seems to be the most effective method for advertising this scholarship.

Water for People

Mr. Bruschwein reported the committee is again doing a raffle at the 2011 conference and hopes to surpass last year's ticket sales of 300 tickets.

Water Utility Council (WUC)

Mr. Jochim reported the DC Fly-in was April 4 and 5. Mr. Jochim and Mr. Duane Friesz represented the North Dakota Section. Topics included security revisions, infrastructure financing, and legislative standards. This was the first joint fly-in with the Water Education Foundation (WEF). The WUC will need to replace Mr. Wade Hesch on the council as his term is expiring.

Membership

Mr. Sletten stated the most recent membership report is 259 members. This includes six late memberships. Recent growth has been in the student chapters while there has been a slow decline in individual and operations memberships. Ms. Ansley talked about changes for life members and that they will now have an \$85 dollar membership fee. This is the largest growing segment of the association and is starting to have an impact on dues collected. The association is not sure how this will be received as it is hard to get feedback from this group.

Student Chapter

Mr. Wadhawan, NDSU Student Chapter president, presented on the Student Chapter. The NDSU Chapter is sending 10 people to the Water Environment Federation Technical Exhibition and Conference (WEFTEC) this year for the student competition. The students are looking for ways to become involved, such as helping at high schools or participating at WEFTEC. NDSU held a very successful joint conference last June with Manitoba and South Dakota. Over 50 were in attendance including many professionals.

Director's Report

Ms. Ansley summarized the Director's Report which was emailed to the board. Highlights include that this past year was very busy. The association budget has been a challenge lately, and changes are being made to keep a balanced budget as membership continues to fall.

According to Ms. Quinn the motel contract has been signed for the Surface Water Workshop. The North Dakota section will be handling the registration this year and has asked for some flexibility in the budget when the

bills come in. The committee has been divided into five subcommittees to do the conference preparation work. The draft program will be finalized this Friday, and a tentative agenda will be published in the next *Official Bulletin*. The PR push will start in January. The tours are being changed from previous years. Currently the conference is on course to have a balanced budget.

Mr. Wavra led the discussion on the 2012 budget. The draft budget has a deficit of approximately \$4,500. This follows a deficit in 2010 and an expected deficit in 2011. The discussion centered on what needs to be done while the section still has a reserve. The primary reason for the projected deficit in 2012 is the need to send the director and director-elect to two meetings. A decision will be needed at the next meeting. Discussion centered on ways to increase income, such as setting up a Manufacturers/ Associates Council (MAC) committee with income being dedicated to specific causes (e.g. student chapters). It was decided to have a meeting the afternoon before the next board meeting. Mr. Chaffee warned the section not to cut top-line items, those items that we are passionate about. Ms. Sullivan may have some benchmark information.

There was discussion to decide if a strategic planning session should be held in 2012, considering the potential budget deficit. It was decided that the strategic planning session is too important to postpone. Mr. Volk moved to hold a strategic planning session this winter and to pull funds from the reserves, if needed. The motion was seconded by Ms. Huether. Motion carried.

Mr. Bruschwein covered the head table arrangements.

The proposed by-law changes were briefly discussed. Ms. Ansley moved that the board approve the proposed changes and take the by-law changes to the general membership of NDAWWA at the October 11, 2011 business meeting and, if approved at that meeting, send them to the association for final approval. The motion was seconded by Mr. Sorenson, and the motion passed.

Ms. Huether moved to adjourn and the motion was seconded by Ms. Ansley. The meeting adjourned at 9:00 a.m.

REVIEW CALENDAR EVENTS:

a. **AWWA/WEA Student Chapter** – UND and NDSU gave a report of their competitions, membership standings, and what NDAWWA

- can do for them. NDSU has 30 members and is sending 10 to WEFTEC. UND has 15 members and is sending four to WEFTEC. Last month a representative from AWWA, APWA, and WEA spoke at an NDSU meeting. The groups are still trying to come up with ideas to bring in younger college students.
- b. **Certificates of Recognition** Sarah reported that only one of the 124 operators who tested in the spring for certification or increased certification will receive certificates as AWWA members. Sarah will not be at the Tuesday lunch so her certificate will be mailed to her supervisor to be awarded to her. Operator membership should be a topic of discussion for strategic planning. Jim Chaffee suggested operators ask their managers to pay their membership (like so many consulting engineering firms do for their employees) or have a meter madness competition to draw operators to conferences and add value to their membership. 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
Fresh Ideas Poster Competition

The North Dakota Section of AWWA took part in the Fresh Ideas Poster Competition for a second year during the North Dakota Water and Pollution Control Conference



New Enforcement Response Policy

A new Enforcement Response Policy (ERP) and Enforcement Targeting Tool (ETT) have been designed by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to assist public water systems in complying with the requirements of the Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA).

The new approach will identify public water systems with violations rising to a level of significant noncompliance by focusing on systems with health-based violations and those with a history of violations across multiple rules. The system-based methodology is intended to ensure consistency and integrity of the national enforcement program. The ERP and ETT will prioritize and direct enforcement response to systems with the most systemic noncompliance. By considering all violations incurred by a system in a comprehensive way, the state will increase effectiveness in its protection of public health.

The goal of this new ERP and ETT is to allow states and EPA to:

- Ensure that both the state and EPA act on and resolve drinking water violations;
- Recognize the validity of informal enforcement efforts while ensuring that, if these efforts are ineffective, enforceable and timely action is taken.
- Increase the effectiveness of state and federal enforcement targeting efforts by providing a "tool" that calculates comprehensive noncompliance status for all systems and identifies those systems not meeting national standards as set by EPA.
- Ensure a means to escalate enforcement efforts based on a prioritized approach.

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This system-based approach uses a tool that prioritizes public water systems by assigning each violation a "weight" or number of points based on the assigned threat to public health. For example, a violation of a maximum contaminant level (MCL) of the total coliform rule (TCR) will carry more weight than that of a Consumer Confidence Reporting (CCR) violation.

The ETT uses a formula to calculate a public water system's compliance score based on open-ended violations and violations that have occurred over the past 5 years. It does not include violations that have returned to compliance or are on the "path to compliance" through an enforceable action or order designed to return the system to compliance.

The formula provides a rank-order of all public water systems based on the total points assigned for each violation and the length of time since the first unaddressed violation. The factors of the formula are:

The severity (S) or weight of the violation is highest for acute contaminant health-based violations. A lower weight is assigned to chronic and other health-based violations (nitrate monitoring and total coliform repeat monitoring violations). The lowest weight is reserved for other monitoring, reporting and other violations.

The number (n) represents years that the system's violations have been unaddressed (0-5).

The formula is: Sum = (S1 + S2 + S3 ...) + n

Points (weight)	Violation Types
10	Nitrate and Nitrite MCL violations, acute TCR MCL violations, turbidity MCL violations.
5	Other chemical MCL violations, nonacute TCR MCL violations, Treatment Technique (TT) violations, TCR repeat monitoring violations, Nitrate monitoring violations, MRDL violations.
1	All other violations (e.g., record keeping violations, monitoring violations not mentioned above).

This is an example of how points are accumulated.

Any public water system with a score greater than or equal to 11 points will be considered a priority system for enforcement response. The state is required to formally address a system's noncompliance as a requirement under agreements with EPA. This is referred to as an Administrative Order or Bilateral Consent Agreement (with or without fines) for failure to comply with the state's drinking water requirements.

Implementation of this new policy and tool will allow flexibility to systems "on the path to compliance" additional time, within reason, to complete construction projects or system upgrades in order to come into compliance with SDWA regulations. In addition, it may also help the state identify systems possibly in need of other state assistance in the areas of Capacity Development and Sustainability.

Actions to lower your ETT scores:

 Collect all required samples during the monitoring period at locations indicated in your sample site plans approved by the North Dakota Department of Health.

- Submit all required monthly, quarterly, or annual reports for your water system.
- Ensure all required sample site plans are current and have been filed with the department.
- Ensure all significant deficiencies identified in your system's sanitary survey are addressed in a timely manner.

The ND Chapter of the American Public Works Association is soliciting nominations for the "2012 Project of the Year" Awards.





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


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Rugby Sanitation Wins the NDSWRA Award in 2011

Optimal Fluoride Addition Level Changes

In January 2011, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services announced that the optimal level for fluoride addition will change from a range of 0.7 to 1.2 milligrams per liter (mg/L) to a single value of 0.7 mg/L for the entire nation. This change is proposed for a number of reasons. It has been determined that 0.7 mg/L is the lowest level that provides oral health benefits to the general population. The advent of climate control in homes and workplaces has made the consumption of water more uniform across the county. In addition, there are now many other sources of dietary fluoride that can contribute to oral health.

While the change is not yet official, the North Dakota Fluoride Addition Program has decided to allow public water systems to change to the new optimal level immediately, if they wish.

The operational range is typically 0.1 mg/L below the optimal level to 0.5 mg/L above that level, so the new

control range will be 0.6 mg/L to 1.2 mg/L. Until this change becomes official, the North Dakota Fluoride Addition Program is allowing systems to use either the old or the new levels. Final approval of the new level has not yet occurred; however, when it does, systems will be allowed time to adjust.

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

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
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




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
